

The Irish Rover

"The Irish Rover" is one of the most traditional St. Patrick's Day songs and a great dance-along. It is about a giant mythical sailing ship and its unfortunate end. The origins of the song are uncertain but Walton's "New Treasurey of Irish Songs and Ballads 2" lists J.M. Crofts as the composer.

A recording by **The Dubliners** and **The Pogues** reached number 8 in the UK Singles Chart and number one in the Irish Singles Chart in 1987. Below, the first two verses and the last verse (out of six) tell the story. The omitted verses describe various crew members.

Setup: Style = Broadway "Basic". On the Keypad press "99" & then press Orch Plus to put Accordion in the Style. Tempo = 130 +/-. Preset = Country (Category) #10. When you have it, use Intro 2 & Ending 2. Be sure to play the first two notes on Beat 4 in the last measure of the Intro. Your screen will display, "Intro Playing" then "Two, Ready, Play". Start on "Play".

On the Fourth of July, eighteen hundred and six We set sail from the sweet Cobh of Cork. We were sailing away with a cargo of bricks For the Grand City Hall in New York. 'Twas a wonderful craft She was rigged fore and aft And oh, how the wild wind drove her. She stood several blasts She had twenty seven masts And they called her The Irish Rover!

We had one million bags of the best Sligo rags We had two million barrels of stone We had three million sides of old blind horses hides We had four million barrels of bones We had five million hogs And six million dogs Seven million barrels of porter We had eight million bales of old nanny-goats' tails In the hold of the Irish Rover! We had sailed seven years When the measles broke out And the ship lost its way in the fog, And that whale of a crew Was reduced down to two Just myself and the Captain's old dog. Then the ship struck a rock Oh Lord what a shock! The bulkhead was turned right over. Turned nine times around And the poor old dog was drowned I'm the last of The Irish Rover!
